

Sketch Your Life! An Introduction to Sketchbook Journaling

SUPPLY LIST

We'll be working in ink and watercolor in this workshop, and the supplies are flexible depending on your own personal preference. Here are some general recommendations:

- A sketchbook suitable for ink & watercolor. 140 lb. paper works well for watercolor. Choose hardbound or spiral bound. Size is up to you, but nothing smaller than 5.5" x 8.5". Here are a few brands that I use and recommend:
 - Stillman and Birn sketchbooks – Alpha, Beta, and Zeta series
 - Handbook Field Watercolor Journal
 - Pentalic Watercolor Field Book
 - Strathmore Windpower sketchbooks with 140 lb. watercolor paper
 - Strathmore Visual Journals (labeled "Watercolor")
- Practice watercolor paper or sketchbook (if you don't want to do practice exercises in your "good" sketchbook)
- Pencil and kneaded eraser and/or white retractable eraser
- Pen with waterproof ink, such as one of the following...
 - Faber-Castell Pitt Artist's Pen, size S or F
 - Sakura Pigma Micron pen. I like sizes 01 and 005.
 - Platinum Carbon Desk Fountain Pen with Platinum Carbon black ink cartridges
- Watercolor paints
 - I recommend artist's quality tube watercolor paints squeezed into a palette. Daniel Smith, Winsor & Newton, and Holbein are among my favorite brands. Color selection is entirely up to you.
 - I tend to carry the following colors in my palette:
 - Hansa Yellow Medium
 - Cadmium Yellow Medium
 - Raw Sienna and/or Yellow Ochre
 - Quinacridone Gold
 - Permanent Alizarin Crimson
 - Winsor Red
 - Permanent Rose
 - Quinacridone Violet
 - Shadow (American Journey) or Moonglow (Daniel Smith)
 - Ultramarine Blue or French Ultramarine
 - Cerulean Blue
 - Cobalt Blue
 - Cobalt Teal Blue
 - Pthalo Blue or Marine Blue
 - Hooker's Green or Sap Green
 - Olive Green
 - Burnt Umber
 - Burnt Sienna
 - Payne's Gray

- Palette

I prefer Alvin Heritage watercolor palettes with 18 wells, filled with tube watercolor paints.

If you're just starting out with watercolors, a smaller travel palette pre-filled with paint would work well for the class. Here are a few possibilities:

Winsor & Newton's Artists' Watercolor Field Box Set

Winsor & Newton's Cotman Watercolor Compact Set

Winsor & Newton Pocket Plus set (very compact, but not much mixing space)

Sakura Koi Watercolor Pocket Field Sketch Box

Sennelier French Artists' Watercolor Half Pan Metal Pocket Box

There are many others that are fine, too, but these are the ones I have experience with.

- Brushes

Watercolor brushes, synthetic or sable. Bring whatever size you like to work with.

Suggested sizes: Rounds: #2, 4, 6, 8, 10 Flats: 1/2"

- Other optional drawing supplies such as felt-tip pens, compass, or ruler

- Miscellaneous supplies for painting such as water container, tissues, paper towels, hair dryer

ITEMS TO BRING FROM HOME (to sketch during class):

1. Two items that have meaning to you, that you could build a journal page around. This could be your grandmother's antique watch, your child's old baby shoes, a mug you bought in Tuscany, a vase you've had since you were a newlywed, or anything that you have a special attachment to.

2. Some fruit or vegetables. We'll be drawing the produce from different angles or in different stages. For instance, an apple could be drawn whole, quartered, cut crosswise, or eaten down to its core. Or strawberries could be drawn from different angles (top, bottom, and side views).

AND/OR Bring your favorite snack. It could be a Snickers bar, a bag of pretzels, a cookie, or even something healthy like carrot sticks!

3. A favorite quote about art (or anything else!) I'll have a list of art quotes you can select from, but you'll be free to choose any quote you like, to include on a sketchbook page.
